From the Desk of Margo O'Neill

I would like to begin by thanking all of you for your support and cooperation with our Professional Development Day on August 26. This gave us the opportunity to do additional training with the staff on some important issues such as our Emergency Response Plan and on how to administer an EpiPen® to students with severe, life-threatening allergies (as demonstrated by nurse/parent Carrie Jankowski). Although we never want to think that an emergency will happen, it makes all of us feel more confident and secure when trained on what to do should one occur.

Regarding the Emergency Response Plan, we will have at least three drills this year so that we can all practice the procedures outlined in our plan. We will practice what to do in different scenarios involving either a lockdown or an evacuation. We will let you know when these drills are scheduled and will inform you what to do should (1) an emergency take place while you are on campus, or (2) if you arrive at school while we are in lockdown or evacuation mode.

One method of communication used at the school is called a K-12 Alert System. This is an automated parent notification system that contacts parents via telephone and email. In an effort to make sure you are receiving all necessary information, it is VERY IMPOR-TANT that you notify the main office should your email or telephone number change.

We had a nice turnout at the New Parent Meeting on August 31. My sincere thanks go to all of the parents who left the comforts of home to attend. One of the things we shared was a list of some amazing people who have attended Montessori schools: **Google founders Sergey Brin and Larry Page, Amazon's founder Jeff Bezos, Wikipedia's co-founder Jimmy Wales, chef Julia Child and rapper Sean "P Ditty" Combs.** Perhaps one day your child's name will be added to this list of famously innovative people!

Teachers have been sharing about some of the donations they have received from their parents. Whether it is a box of pencils or an iPad (yes, an iPad!), we cannot thank you enough for your kind generosity. We also deeply appreciate the donation of your time, skills and talents.

Infants & Toddlers News - by Jeni Johnson— September Greetings to you all

We always look forward to September; it means we have almost made it through another summer and will get to really enjoy being outdoors again. I would like to share with you an excerpt from <u>The Joyful</u> <u>Child</u> regarding the young child from birth to age 3 regarding developing trust in the world and then developing trust in oneself. This is one of the most important stages in a Child's life for developing trust and it is certainly something that we strive for in the Infant and Toddler rooms. Please enjoy reading the paragraphs below as we look forward to a wonderful school year building important relationships with you and your Child.

Developing Trust in the World

It used to be generally agreed that babies were not aware, or that they had no memories of early life. Now we know that the strongest, deepest, and longest-lasting memories are formed at this time. It is common knowledge today that during the first months the child develops his basic attitude toward the world. As in our Infant Program the caregivers learn to listen to the sounds a baby makes, to watch quietly, to observe facial expressions and body movements, to see what the child is trying to tell us, and to get to know this unique human, giving the message that the child is cherished and the world is a safe place. As we get to know the infant and their uniqueness, the caregivers are able to respond gently to their needs, taking into account the infant's individual likes or dislikes, and communicating to the child that they will be there for them to provide for their needs with the utmost respect.

Developing Trust in Oneself

A young child develops trust in herself beginning in the first year of life as she interacts with the environment. She learns to move out into the world, to touch and grasp, through her own effort, those things she has been looking at and longing to reach. With the loving understanding help of adults and older children, and in an environment that meets her changing needs, she will learn that she is capable and strong, that her choices are wise, that she is indeed a fine person.


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Preprimary News - by Sherra Sieben ~ The preprimary classrooms are all looking so great. We are all very excited to have new floors and have done some re-vamping in our Practical life area of the class. To help you as a parent of a preprimary child understand a little bit more about the classroom and the materials I will be giving a very detailed description of one piece of material that each and every child works with at this age. I know it is difficult to get any kind of information out of your child at this stage, so hopefully these will help a little. We all look forward to another great year of working with you and your child together at Villa.

POURING— I can pour solids from one pitcher to another. I try to be very careful to keep all the solids in the pitcher. I am learning to be neat. I am learning coordination, order and concentration. I am also learning about space relationships, size and volume. After I can pour solids, I will pour water. Then I can serve my own juice or serve others. I work on variations of pouring all year.

These are the steps:

- 1. Pouring solids big to little beans, corn, rice
- 2. Pouring liquids water, juice
- 3. Pouring into pitchers the same size to pouring into smaller and smaller containers
- 4. Pouring equal amounts into 3 or more containers
- 5. Pouring through funnels
- 6. Using a ladle to serve punch





LIMIT THE SUN BUT NOT THE FUN! BE "SUNWISE!"

Use Sunscreen Every Day!

Even on cloudy days, the sun's rays can damage your skin. Wear sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher. Apply 10 minutes before going outside and reapply every 2 ½ hours or sooner if perspiring or engaging in water activities. Wearing sunscreen every day is as important as brushing your teeth!

Wear a Wide-Brimmed Hat and Lip Balm!

A hat with a wide brim offers better protection for your scalp, ears, face and the back of your neck than a baseball cap or visor. Remember to protect lips with SPF 15+ lip balm.

Wear Sunglasses!

Sunglasses reduce sun exposure that can damage your eyes and lead to cataracts. Check the label and choose sunglasses that block at least 90% of UVA and UVB rays.

Cover Up!

Wear long sleeves and pants if possible to protect your skin when playing or working outdoors. Darker colors and fabric with a tight weave provide the most protection.

<u>Limit Time in the Midday Sun!</u>

Limit your outdoor activities when the UV rays are strongest and most damaging (10 a.m. to 4 p.m.). Remember: Look for your shadow—If no shadow, seek cover!

Take Cover!

Find something fun that doesn't involve exposure to direct sun. Take cover under a tree, ramada or find an indoor activity inside a gym, library or classroom during peak UV.

Check the daily UV Index!

Did you know you can check the intensity of the sun's rays every day? The ultraviolet or UV index is a way of measuring the sun's intensity. The scale is from 1 to 10. The higher the UV, the more careful you should be. A day with a UV rating of 10 requires more protection than a day with a rating of 1. Click on **NWS** to see your city's daily index.

Avoid Sun Lamps and Tanning Booths!

These artificial sources of UV light can cause as much damage as the sun's UV rays. Remember, there is no such thing as a safe tan. To get a tan, skin damage has to occur!
